Prior to the coming of Christianity, the Hrangkhohs were not inclined to female education. The general attitude was that it was useless to provide education to girls. As education developed, every parent encouraged both boys and girls to acquire English education.

The above studies indicate the change and transformation which took place in the Hrangkhoh society as a result of the British rule, Christianity and education. Their impacts were negative and positive. In negative, some of the indigenous good customs and practices were given up in the name of Christianity; whereas in positive impact, people have a written literature, acquired education, new ideology and New hope in Christ.
